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


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DEDICATION

We who dedicate and remain this side of the sunset must travel into the future but ---





simply ignored us or took brief note of our doings with the patronizing air once reserved for W.P.A. cultural pro-


Today, one year later, the entire picture has changed. We have an elastic and diversified curriculum including many electives; after last summer and fall's remodelling program we have at last a plant physically adequate to our needs; we have not only last year's unique, inflation-born campus grocery, but a full-fledged, incorporated college co-op. Despite a declining percentage of veterans, enrollment reached an all-time high of 1527 during the winter term, and there is a new spirit evident among the students, manifesting itself in constantly multiplying organizations and activities and in the increasing number of "old grads" who drift nostalgically back to the campus. Furthermore, the startled tax payers of Oregon have learned that all this is costing them not one cent.

As a consequence, Dr. Epler has been editorially commended more than once for his outstanding service to higher education in Oregon, and we have begun to receive frequent and respectful mention on local sports and society pages. 





GENERAL EXTENSION DIVISION

The Portland Extension Center, which is in its 30th year, is located in Portland and is a department of the General Extension Division of the Oregon State System of Higher Education. During 1946-47, 4,139 students were enrolled in the adult education classes. The 1947-48 fall term enrollment of 3,043 represents a substantial increase over previous fall terms.

The courses are planned primarily for those who are occupied during the day and cover a wide range of subjects. Classes are offered in art, business administration, chemistry, economics, engineering, drama, education, English composition and literature, public speaking, French, Spanish, Russian, German, Esperanto, geography, geology, history, home economics, horticulture, landscape architecture, journalism, mathematics, music, nursing education, physical education, physics, psychology, public health, sociology and zoology.

Approximately 176 courses were given this past year. The majority of classes meet at Lincoln high school. Art classes were held in the evening at the Portland Art Museum.

The student body represents those who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity of working toward their degrees at both the graduate and undergraduate levels, persons who wish to improve their technical knowledge in a particular field, those who for purely cultural reasons enroll in courses in which they have a particular interest, and auditors who enroll for the joy of learning.


WE TRAVEL NOT


HONKY TONK STOMP







CHRISTMAS FORMAL





LETTERMEN'S CLUB






WE TRAVEL NOT



Student government at Vanport is vested in a single body, the student council. The council is composed of fifteen representatives, elected directly by the students. Elections are held in September and February, giving the politicians sufficient exercise and the students a close check on their government.

The fall council was faced with the problem of integrating an ever-growing list of student activities. This problem was partially met by the formation of the interclub social council and the publications board. By creating these agencies and broadening the scope of the council committees, the fall council met the demands of a more active student body.

The spring council, building on the foundations laid by its predecessors, contemplated an even broader program. Retaining the features inaugurated by the fall council, the group planned a revision of the student body constitution, including changes in the structure and method of election of council members, with an eye towards making it a more efficient, representative instrument.












SECOND ANNIVERSARY





WE TRAVEL NOT

Some of the players who plan to return to Vanport next season voice emphatic hopes for a really fine squad to carry the V.E.C. colors.
















BASKETBALL






SCHEDULE

Matches with Portland University, Willamette University and other nearby schools guaranteed the spectator a good show and the contestant a good fight.




