

JAPANESE SOLDIER SCORES K. C. NURSES FOR RACE BIAS

An open letter to the nurses of Harborview County Hospital, criticizing them for the recent opposition to the return to the hospital of a Japanese-American nurse, Masako Takayoshi, was received by The Times from a Japanese-American soldier in France, Pfc. Yozo Miyako.

Miss Takayoshi stayed only a few days at the hospital, leaving after a petition against her presence had been circulated among staff members. Private Miyako's letter to the nurses said:

"Really, I'm surprised and hurt in your narrow-mindedness in your very unfair stand against one of your former co-workers, a woman of your own profession. I thought there was an unwritten code of understanding among all of you, regardless of race or color."

"To the nurses that refused to sign the petition against Nurse Takayoshi, 'Hats off!' You really took a step toward making America safe for democracy."

Council Asked To Ban Discrimination

A petition to the City Council asking enactment of an ordinance making it unlawful for employers to "discriminate against citizens of this community because of race, creed or color" was substituted over the signatures of several union officials and others who declared themselves concerned with minority race matters.

The communication declared that in Seattle, "as in most every city throughout the nation, men and women of minority groups are barred from employment, restaurants, hotels and other places, in our community, because of race, creed or color."

The Council was asked to set a date at which the proposed ordinance could be discussed.

OPA REFUNDS

Leland Glazier, OPA investigator in Tucson, Ariz., revealed that owners of frame, corrugated iron and tar paper shacks around Ft. Huachuca are being sued by the Office of Price Administration for alleged overcharges on houses rented to hundreds of Negro soldiers stationed at the Fort and their families.

These families were required to live in the shacks with only the barest conveniences, paying sums from \$25 to \$100 per month.

Refunds have been made continuously since the investigation began, but hundreds of dollars await the soldiers who are now at the battlefield or elsewhere.

Editor's note: Anyone reading this report and formerly a victim of above mentioned circumstances would do well to get in touch with OPA authorities.

SPEAKER, W. S. OF S. C.

Through the Y. W. C. A. yours truly was the speaker for the Women's Society of Christian Service at the Methodist Church in the Dalles, Oregon, last Wednesday. The theme, "Advancing Towards Race Relations," brought forth references of many experiences in present day problems affecting peoples, as we observed and pointed out, that one of the challenging problems to be faced now and in the post war world building program lies in the field of race relationship — that peace is being written in the attitudes of the people; and we cannot have real democracy without a Christian solution to this tremendous question.

We proceeded to think with the group of 40 women assembled, on the most discussed topic of the day, the question about Negroes. America is deeply concerned about the Negro problem, and is pitifully blind to the Negro possibility. We had them know that aside from a global war, there is in America, a battle being waged for decent race relations, on several fronts: 1st, EMPLOYMENT — If any people have economic security, they have the basis of a good life. Many Negroes, even today, are kept from skilled jobs and foremanships, not for lack of ability—but for lack of whiteness. 2nd, HOUSING—No people can live decently unless they live freely. In practically every American city, Negroes are confined to restricted areas. They are confined to these districts by an atmosphere of prejudice and discrimination. 3rd, SCHOOLS—The problem here is not only to make sure that equal facilities are provided for all the people, but to provide school texts and daily procedure

so that democracy is taught and practiced. 4th—LAW AND ORDER, AND THE POLICE — In many cities, police, far from protecting Negroes, have been in themselves forces of repressing and disturbance. The police have most immediate contact with the people. Wise city planning calls for specific orders for equal protection to Negroes and Whites alike—of life, liberty, and property, and for detailed education of the police personnel in ways of insuring fair play.

Whatever the success on given fronts, full victory will come only as you—Americans all—determine that they are going to put aside their pretty prejudices, and that regardless of race, creed, or color they are going to treat all people on the democratic basis of their individual merits.



the Constitutional guarantees apply to all citizens despite strong opposition, have endeared them to most Negroes.

In the front rank among the liberal groups are the Civil Liberties league, the Communist party, and the International Labor Defense. These groups fight injustices commensurate with rights of all citizens. The Scottsboro case being an example. Since 1930, these liberal forces have challenged the unconstitutional laws and customs of the Southern States with regard to racial discrimination, poll-taxes, and the Hitlerian policy of summary execution.
