Providing 'inclusive college experience' for intellectually disabled students

THE FEBRUARY RAPS program introduces members to special education professors Ann Fullerton and Mary Morningstar, whose February 20 pres-



entation, "Providing an Inclusive College Experience for Students with Intellectual Disabilities," highlights the work they are doing in PSU's

Career and Community Studies Program. The program's mission includes making sure that each student's experience is individually designed to support inclusive academic and career experiences leading to meaningful, integrated employment and self-determination.

The two are co-directors of the Think College Inclusion Oregon-PSU (TCIO-PSU), a project funded by a U.S. Department of Education grant. Think College is a national organization dedicated to developing, expanding, and improving inclusive higher education options for people with intellectual disabilities.

Ann Fullerton is professor emeritus of education at Portland State. She joined the special education faculty in 1990, teaching across several areas in special education including literacy, assessment, and collaboration. Her

focus was on helping adolescents gain the self-knowledge, life skills, and selfdetermination needed for the transition to adulthood. She holds a Ph.D. from Vanderbilt University.

Mary Morningstar came to PSU from the University of Kansas, where

she earned a Ph.D. in special education. Her research encompasses college and career readiness for youth with disabilities, teacher education and development, and

secondary inclusive educational reform. She is the author of *The Educator's Guide to Implementing Transition Planning and Services*, published in 2017.

The RAPS meeting begins at noon Thursday, February 20, in 333 Smith Memorial Student Union, 1825 SW Broadway, with a light deli lunch. The presentation by professors Fullerton and Morningstar follows at about 12:45 p.m.
