

Potluck features 'Merry Wives' preview

THE WIT OF SHAKESPEARE and the charm of Viennese operetta come together in the PSU Opera Program's spring production of *Merry Wives of Windsor*, with music by Otto Nicolai and libretto by Salomon Hermann Mosenthal.

Performances are scheduled in April but RAPSters will get a preview at the RAPS member meeting Thursday, March 19, from Opera Program Director Christine Meadows and her student performers.

Set in Windsor, England, in the early 15th century, the three-act comic opera relates the adventures (and misadventures) of the middle-aged knight Sir John Falstaff as he attempts to woo two married women of the town.

The role of Falstaff will be sung by PSU faculty member Richard Zeller, a baritone whose 32-year performance career includes 11 seasons with the Metropolitan Opera. Meadows has served as director of opera and vocal area coordinator in the PSU School of Music and Theater since 2006. She received her undergraduate training at Portland State and earned a master of music degree in vocal performance from Indiana University. She went on to pursue a successful career as a concert and opera soloist before coming to PSU as a faculty member. In 2017 she was named the Vollum Professor of Voice.

The March meeting begins at noon on March 19 with a potluck lunch in 333 SMSU. (Please see page 5 in this issue for more information.) At approximately 12:45 p.m. the group will make its way to 225 Lincoln Hall, where Meadows will speak and the PSU students will perform beginning at 1:00 p.m.



CO-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE RAPS awards send message about retirees' contributions

EACH SPRING RAPS PRESENTS one or more awards. They are of two types: Outstanding Retiree Award and Special Recognition Award. An Outstanding Retiree



Award goes to one or more PSU retirees. The award recognizes retired faculty and staff for service to the Portland State, to the community, to their profession, and to RAPS.

The Special Recognition Award can go

to anyone who has aided both RAPS and the University. This award may be given to persons not yet retired and even folks who are not, or were not, PSU faculty or staff.

Why does RAPS give these awards?

The awards communicate to Portland State administrators, faculty, and staff the importance of the unpaid work PSU retirees do on behalf of the University. Retirees sometimes keep active writing research grants. Retirees continue publishing journal articles, conducting groundbreaking research, mentoring young colleagues, and serving on committees and boards of their professional organizations. Some retired faculty and staff are working to preserve PSU history. Recognition of volunteer work is important. In the recent past free parking for emeriti faculty was on the budget chopping block. Parking remained free once the administration was made aware of the number of volunteer hours contributed by retired faculty.

Many retired faculty continue to mentor students and to serve on master's or Ph.D. committees. Students benefit from having faculty continue on committees after retirement, because it minimizes the need to replace people on the committee. I am aware of a recent Ph.D. committee composed entirely of retired faculty (even the outside member was retired).

The awards also acknowledge the vital role PSU retirees play in the community. Some examples: serving as volunteers at nonprofits and senior services organizations, conducting trainings needed by community organizations, and serving on committees and advisory boards.

Please assist the Awards Committee in the future by seriously considering nominating deserving colleagues for a RAPS award.

THE BOOK GROUP met February 17 at the home of Felicia Wirtz to discuss *The Overstory* by Richard Powers. A Pulitzer Prize winner, it has won wide acclaim.

The setting is that of the protests that attempted to prevent timber harvests in western forests, told through the eyes of a variety of participants. The impact of these protests on lives, and the ethical issues raised, form the core of the book.

Felicia described the meeting: "For the first time I can remember we strayed from the book into a number of personal experiences by members who participated to a small extent in protest gatherings.

"As to the book itself, we all had the same feeling of bewilderment at the beginning but felt much better about it halfway through. We liked the fact that we were left wondering what (some characters) had decided to do."

We will discuss *Educated: A Memoir* by Tara Westover, the story of a young woman who, after a childhood where she had no schooling, managed to leave her survivalist background and move very successfully into the world.

In memoriam: Roger Lee Moseley, 1928-2020

ROGER L. MOSELEY, who served Portland State for more than 20 years as a professor of business administration, died January 14 in Beaverton at age 91.

Professor Moseley was born June 5, 1928, in Bellingham, Washington, and grew up in Olympia. After serving in the Marine Corps, he earned a bachelor's degree from the



University of Washington in 1951 and an M.B.A. from Harvard in 1953. He then moved to Hawaii, where he helped establish the University of Hawaii's Hilo campus. Professor Moseley served as director at the Hilo campus for six years, then moved to the Honolulu campus, where he was acting dean of

the college of general studies. He returned to the University of Washington and was awarded a Ph.D. in 1966.

The following year Professor Moseley joined the Portland State business faculty. During his PSU career he served as chair of the Department of Management, as the interim dean of the School of Business Administration, and on an advisory committee for the School's Advisory Board.

Professor Moseley published numerous professional papers and served on many school and University commit-

tees as well as community, professional, and honorary boards. In the 1970s and 1980s he helped US Bancorp's program to train and develop women employees for management positions.

It was at the School of Business Administration in 1967 that Professor Moseley met his future wife, Sylvia. They married on April 21, 1982, on St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands. He continued his interest in boating with Sylvia; the couple owned two powerboats and a trimaran during their marriage.

Professor Moseley was an amateur magician, entertaining children in hospitals, schools, and birthday parties, as well as adults at parties and celebrations. Dr. M performed magic tricks while his sidekick, Tomato the Clown, made balloon animals. He was a competitive player of chess and table tennis who wouldn't hesitate to trounce his opponent just because they were his sons. He encouraged Roger and Randy to persevere until they could beat him fair and square.

He was also a car enthusiast, but with a touch of whimsy-he once added a performance exhaust system to the family's station wagon, making it sound like a hot rod. And it wasn't until he was 86 that he sold his sports car.

Professor Moseley is survived by his wife, Sylvia; his sons, Roger and Randy; his stepdaughter, Kim; and many grandchildren and great-grandchildren. His brother, Spencer, and two half-sisters, Marguerite Clark and Doras McBride, predeceased him.


