Dear Mrs. Sharp:

In reply to your communication of recent date asking for information regarding the Market. If you will remember the first installation was in the nature of an experiment in the year 1914, when the City put up temporary stalls along Yamhill Street. The cost of this temporary experiment was \$647.82. Since that time we have erected one thousand lineal feet of the steel constructed umbrella sheds at a cost of \$8,841.76. The cost of operation, together with the receipts follows below, from the year 1914 to the year 1919:
