# Open & Sustainable Scholarly Communication

- Demonstrate our principles to publishers
- Poll campus on its scholarly communication needs
- Invite campus to learn more about scholarly publishing
- Stakeholders:
  - General Counsel
  - Faculty union
  - Researchers

# Survey

- To learn the extent to which OSU faculty currently make their research openly available, ascertain their awareness of open access, their support for open access, and their preferences for achieving it.
- 214 responses.
- Strong, nuanced responses!

# Survey II

- Faculty support Open ideals
- Academic social networking sites are common
- Some faculty are concerned about Open journal quality and costs
- No statistically significant difference between tenured and non-tenured faculty responses.
- Nearly 30% of respondents have paid page fees.
