In 1919, there were 87 stalls — 50 on the North side and
37 on the south side

These stalls rented for \$15⁺/day. ~~67~~

The question for the City: Should the City enlarge and extend
the market, and what regulations will protect the public
health while bringing down the cost of distribution
to the lowest possible figure?
